From the dean

All Saints

Though Satan breaks our dark glass into shards
Each shard still shines with Christ's reflected light,
It glances from the eyes, kindles the words
Of all his unknown saints. The dark is bright
With quiet lives and steady lights undimmed,
The witness of the ones we shunned and shamed.
Plain in our sight and far beyond our seeing
He weaves them with us in the web of being
They stand beside us even as we grieve,
The lone and left behind whom no one claimed,
Unnumbered multitudes, he lifts above
The shadow of the gibbet and the grave,
To triumph where all saints are known and named;
The gathered glories of His wounded love.

This sonnet by Malcolm Guite is from Sounding the Seasons, published by Canterbury Press,. It remembers the light that shines in darkness, who first kindled it, and how we can all reflect it.

Halloween was never mentioned when I was growing up. Now it is everywhere, and shops are adorned with cobwebs and spiders. Halloween itself simply means the eve of all Hallows, and All Hallows is the Christian feast of All Saints Day, which we celebrate on 1st November or the first Sunday after that, a day when we think particularly of those who have died, and who, even in this life, kindled a light for us, or more precisely reflected for us and to us, the already-kindled light of Christ! It is followed immediately on November 2nd by All Souls Day, the day we remember all the souls who have gone before us into the light of Heaven. It is good that we should have a season of the year for remembrance and a time when we feel that the veil between time and eternity is thin and we can sense that greater and wider communion of saints to which we belong. It is good to remember. It is also good and right that the Church settled this feast on a time in the turning of the year when the pre-Christian Celtic religions were accustomed to think of and make offerings for the dead. But it was right that, though they kept the day, they changed the custom. The greatest and only offering, to redeem both the living and the dead, has been made by Christ and if we want to celebrate our loving connections we need only now make gifts to the living, as we do in offering sweets to the 'trick or treaters' in this season, and far more profoundly in exchanging gifts at Christmas.

So today we remember, those who have died and particularly those who have inspired us in the faith.

Some of the students here today are off to Rwanda soon, to listen, to learn, to experience, and to serve. Rwanda has seen much sadness, and has much remembering after the massacre of so many of her people. We too have many to remember.

We wish the students and staff well on your journey. May you be enriched and grow from your experience, while making true connections with the people of Rwanda. I hope you will share some of your experiences with us on your return.
