A Reading from The First Letter to the Corinthians

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing. Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in

part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love. *I Corinthians* 13.1-13

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.' All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, 'Is not this Joseph's son?' He said to them, 'Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, "Doctor, cure yourself!" And you will say, "Do here also in your home town the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum." ' And he said, 'Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's home town. But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up for three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian.' When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way. Luke 4.21-30 For the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Reflection 4th Sunday after Epiphany – Luke 4:21-30

The Luke passage for today is a continuation from last week's Gospel where Luke tells us that Jesus has been welcomed to his home town of Nazareth. He had overcome temptations in the wilderness and now joined family, friends, and townsfolk in the synagogue on a Sabbath evening where he was invited to read and teach from Scripture, principally Isaiah. Jesus proclaimed that "today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing" (v21). Much longed-for promises were to be fulfilled – sight restored, captives released, freedom for the oppressed, the inauguration of

the year of the Lord's favour. How amazing, if not perfect! This is what our 'local lad' will do for us! Welcome home! Luke tells us that all present were amazed at Jesus' gracious words. So why did the atmosphere on that Sabbath evening in Nazareth turn so murderous toward Jesus? Luke tells us that it was when Jesus delved into the essence of God's vision for humanity, quoting Isaiah (61:1-2) and making clear reference to prophets Elijah and Elisha that the mood changed. His words were seen as a direct challenge to their reading of Scripture. The implication or meaning of Jesus' reference to the stories from the two prophets were not lost on the crowd. Elijah was sent to bring relief to a non-Jewish widow, a woman and an outsider and Elisha, to cleanse Naaman, a double outsider, a foreigner and an outcast. It is suggested that the citizens of Jesus home town held the firm belief that God's covenant was exclusively with them, (the covenanted people of Israel) so any hint of a radical inclusiveness, a sharing in the richness of God's salvation beyond the border of the covenanted people, was beyond contemplation. It felt intolerable. How could Divine favour know no boundaries, just as pain, hurt, poverty, exclusion, oppression know no boundaries? A new radical mission was being named and proclaimed. What the passage does is challenge comfort zones in respect of who we believe Jesus to be.

We can finish this reflection with St Paul's first letter to the Corinthians (13:1-13) that in Jesus we will know a love so extravagant, so lavish, so overflowing and plentiful that we give it away, freely and joyously.

Reverend Florence Li Tim-Oi (1907-1994)

On the 26th of January we observed the feast day of the of Rev., Florence Li Tim-Oi, who was ordained on the 25 January 1944. Rev Florence was the first woman to be ordained a priest in the Anglican Communion. Thirty years later in 1971 the diocese and Province of Hong Kong (Florence's home diocese) became the first province of the Anglican communion to officially ordain women as priest. Still today some Provinces and Dioceses do not allow women to be ordained as priest. The diocese of Gippsland and this cathedral church has been and still is richly blessed by the 'Spiritual Daughters' of Florence Li Tim-Oi. We give thanks for the ministry of all ordained women within our church, inspired by Florence's example. Florence Li Tim-Oi (priest) may you rest in peace, faithful servant of our God.
