A Reading from the Book of Exodus

Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. Afterwards all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the Lord had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; but whenever Moses went in before the Lord to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with him. *Exodus 34.29-35* Hear the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

Psalm 99

The Lord is king, let the nations tremble:

he is enthroned upon the cherubim; let the earth quake.

The Lord is great in Zion:

he is high above all nations.

Let them praise your great and terrible name:

A Reading from The Second Letter to the Corinthians

Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit. Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practise cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God. 2 Corinthians 3.12 - 4.2 Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah'—not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen. On the next day, when they had come down from the mountain, a great crowd met him. Just then a man from the crowd shouted, 'Teacher, I beg you to look at my son; he is my only child. Suddenly a spirit seizes him, and all at once he shrieks. It throws him into convulsions until he foams at the mouth; it mauls him and will scarcely leave him. I begged your disciples to cast it out, but they could not.' Jesus answered, 'You faithless and perverse generation, how much longer must I be with you and bear with you? Bring your son here.' While he was coming, the demon dashed him to the ground in convulsions. But Jesus rebuked the unclean spirit, healed the boy, and gave him back to his father. And all were astounded at the greatness of God. Luke 9.28-47

For the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Reflection: Luke 9:28-36 The Transfiguration/ the last Sunday after Epiphany.

The Incarnation of our Lord and the Transfiguration of our Lord bracket the weeks of Christmas & Epiphany.

Prior to Jesus' transfiguration upon the mountaintop, He was busy throughout Galilee, healing, casting out demons, preaching, teaching about the Kingdom of God and bringing solace and comfort to wounded hearts, minds and bodies. He is also talking more with his disciples about his impending suffering, betrayal and death as he prepared to make his final journey toward Jerusalem. We also gain a strong sense that Jesus' disciples at this time lived in a fog of not understanding, after all who would want their beloved master, teacher and friend to face a horrendous death?

Jesus takes Peter, James and John to a mountain top, perhaps a long trek to the summit? A private environment where historically in Israel's history, special divine revelations occurred. Luke emphasizes this as a place of prayer. The 'three' witnessed something phenomenal. They saw the divine presence, the love, the Glory of God shine forth in Jesus' face. Luke does not say Jesus' face changed, rather it was the appearance of the always present divine glory (not noticed before by the 'three') that was now seen. Their 'sight' was transfigured.

Here on this mountain top, two recognized giants of the 'faith' in Israel's history appear, (Moses and Elijah). Their conversation with Jesus affirms and supports Him in the direction He is to take for the salvation of the world. The 'three' clogged with sleep just manage to hold out and experience this and naturally want to remain in this glorious place, to by-pass any possibility of Jesus' prediction of suffering and death to fulfil the scriptures.

A core truth of the gospel is also revealed. Enveloped in cloud the 'three' (and all disciples) are instructed to listen to 'my son my chosen'. God in Jesus was teaching the disciples that it was in them ('and in us') that transformation would take place, as they listened to, understood and practiced the kingdom ethic by responding to the world's evil with good, to show agape towards all, to see everyone as made in the image of God.

Sometimes we are dazzled on a mountaintop, sometimes in a world of suffering and pain, sometimes somewhere in between, however the glory of Jesus, the fullness of God, the grace of the Spirit, is within us, around us, everywhere, in every moment of our living, if we can but see and listen.

Archbishop Geoffrey, the Primate of the Anglican Church of Australia, has requested that we make **this Sunday 27th February and Ash Wednesday 2nd March as days of prayer for peace.** At all our Sunday and Ash Wednesday services we will light a candle for peace.

On Friday the 25th February, our Acting Dean Liam and his wife Madeleine, represented Bishop Richard and the Cathedral Church of St Paul's Sale at the Installation of the Rev'd Canon Michael David Llewelyn Davies as the new dean of Ballarat. Please keep Dean Michael and wife Alex, in your prayers as they settle into their new ministry in Ballarat.

Lent 2022

Lent begins on the 2nd March. We will hold two services on that day, one at 10 am and the other 6pm? At both services the imposition of ashes will take place.

Shrove Tuesday, the evening before Lent, at 6pm there will be a traditional pancakes evening with pre-made pancakes with a range of fillings. The evening will also include a 'burning of palm crosses and blessing of the new ashes' ceremony. The symbolism behind this is that we have carried our palm cross since 'Palm Sunday 2021 - daily celebrating our Lord's saving grace and daily inviting Him into our lives. In burning these crosses, we burn our neglects and failures.

On Ash Wednesday we are signed with these ashes for our Lenten observance 2022.

Could those who have palm crosses at home, bring them back to church on Sunday 27^{th} February.

Ash Wednesday services this week at St Pauls are at 10am and 5.30pm **Lent Study program,** this year we are offering two study programs:

- 1) Conversations with our Awesome God This is a six-session study. by Bishop Bill Ray (a former Diocesan Education Officer). The Study booklet cost \$12.00.

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Letter from Primate of the Anglican Church of Australia

Friday 25 February 2022

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I write to you in response to the escalating situation in Ukraine.

The attack by Russia is an act of evil which impacts not only upon Ukraine, but Europe and the whole world. This attack by one nation on another has rightly provoked outrage, sanctions, and condemnation.

Our rightful response must be first to pray to call upon God to seek His intervention in the hearts and minds of our world leaders that they may once again choose peace over war.

We must pray for the people of Ukraine, for their safety and wellbeing and pray for a ceasefire and the withdrawal of Russian forces.

Finally we must pray for the strength of those who work across international borders for unity and harmony.

I echo the call of the Archbishop of Canterbury to make this Sunday a day for Prayer for Peace and I have included a prayer that you may like to use.

I also encourage you to participate with the wider church in Pope Francis's call to make Ash Wednesday, 2 March, a day of prayer and fasting for peace.

Psalm 46 opens with a confident statement of faith: God is our refuge and strength, an everpresent help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear. This is a much-needed reminder in times like these of the sovereignty and power of God and of his presence with us that calls us to trust in him.

The psalm goes on to say he makes wars cease to the ends of the earth (verse 9). This is our prayer that once again God would intervene and bring an end to war.

The psalmist then declares God's message to us "be still and know that I am God." This message continues to be the message for us today. It reminds us to have confidence in our God who is indeed a refuge and strength for all who call upon him.

Be assured of my prayers for you at this time.
