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

Sunday of the Passion / Palm Sunday

This morning begins the Great Week of the Christian Year. During Lent we have been preparing by works of love and self-sacrifice for the celebration of the Lord's death and resurrection. With Christians throughout the world, we come together this week to call to mind, and to express in word and action, the centre of the Easter mystery:

our Lord's Passover from death to life.

Christ entered in triumph into the Holy City to complete his work as Messiah: to suffer, to die and to rise to new life.

Today we commit ourselves to walk the way of the cross, so that, sharing his sufferings, we may be united with him in his risen life.

All may hold up their palms.

Sovereign God, we thank you for these crosses of palm. May they be for us signs of the victory of your Son. May we who carry them in his name ever hail him as our Messiah, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke **Hosanna in the highest.**

Narrator: As Jesus came near Bethphage and Bethany at the Mount of Olives, he

sent two disciples ahead with these instructions:

Jesus: Go to the village there ahead of you; as you go in, you will find a colt

tied up that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If someone

asks you why you are untying it, tell him that the Master needs it.

Narrator: They went on their way and found everything just as Jesus had told

them. As they were untying the colt, its owners said to them:

Owner: Why are you untying it?

Narrator: They answered:

Disciple: The Master needs it.

Narrator: And they took the colt to Jesus. Then they threw their cloaks over the

animal and helped Jesus get on. As he rode on, people spread their cloaks

on the road.

When he came near Jerusalem, at the place where the road went down the Mount of Olives, the large crowd of his disciples began to thank God and praise him in loud voices for all the great things that they had seen:

Crowd: Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!

Peace in heaven and glory to God!

Narrator: Then some of the Pharisees in the crowd spoke to Jesus.

Pharisee: Teacher, command your disciples to be quiet!

Jesus: I tell you that if they keep quiet, the stones themselves will start

shouting.

The Gospel reading: Luke Passion

Luke: Hear the passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Luke.

(Luke 23. 1-49)

Luke: Then the assembly rose as a body and brought Jesus before Pilate. They

began to accuse him, saying,

Priests: We found this man perverting our nation, forbidding us to pay taxes to

the emperor, and saying that he himself is the Messiah, a king.

Luke: Then Pilate asked him,

Pilate: Are you the king of the Jews?

Luke: He answered,

Jesus: You say so.

Luke: Then Pilate said to the chief priests and the crowds,

Pilate: I find no basis for an accusation against this man.

Luke: But they were insistent and said,

Priests: He stirs up the people by teaching throughout all Judea, from Galilee

where he began even to this place.

Luke: When Pilate heard this, he asked whether the man was a Galilean. And

when he learned that he was under Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him off to Herod, who was himself in Jerusalem at that time. When Herod saw Jesus, he was very glad, for he had been wanting to see him for a long time, because he had heard about him and was hoping to see him perform some sign. He questioned him at some length, but Jesus gave him no answer. The chief priests and the scribes stood by, vehemently

accusing him. Even Herod with his soldiers treated him with contempt

and mocked him; then he put an elegant robe on him, and sent him back

to Pilate. That same day Herod and Pilate became friends with each other; before this they had been enemies.

Pilate then called together the chief priests, the leaders, and the people, and said to them.

Pilate:

You brought me this man as one who was perverting the people; and here I have examined him in your presence and have not found this man guilty of any of your charges against him. Neither has Herod, for he sent him back to us. Indeed, he has done nothing to deserve death. I will therefore have him flogged and release him.

Luke: Then they all shouted out together,

Crowd: Away with this fellow! Release Barabbas for us!

Luke: (This was a man who had been put in prison for an insurrection that had taken place in the city, and for murder.)

> Pilate, wanting to release Jesus, addressed them again; but they kept shouting,

Crowd: Crucify, crucify him!

Luke: A third time he said to them.

Pilate: Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no ground for the sentence of death; I will therefore have him flogged and then release

him.

But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be Luke: crucified; and their voices prevailed. So Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. He released the man they asked for, the one who had been put in prison for insurrection and murder, and he handed Jesus over as they wished.

> As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming from the country, and they laid the cross on him, and made him carry it behind Jesus. A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him. But Jesus turned to them and said,

Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For the days are surely coming when they will say, 'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed.' Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?

Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him. When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said.

Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing. Jesus:

Luke: And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by,

watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying,

Priests: He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his

chosen one!

Luke: The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine,

and saying,

Soldiers: If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!

Luke: There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Jews.'

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and

saying,

Criminal Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!

Luke: But the other rebuked him, saying,

Criminal Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of

2: condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are

getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing

wrong.

Luke: Then he said,

Criminal Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.

2:

Luke: Jesus replied,

Jesus: Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.

Luke: It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until

three in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the

temple was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said,

Jesus: Father, into your hands I commend my spirit.

Luke: Having said this, he breathed his last. When the centurion saw what had

taken place, he praised God and said,

Centurion: Certainly this man was innocent.

Luke: And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this spectacle saw

Luke what had taken place, they returned home, beating their breasts. But all

23.49 his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from

Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things.

Palm Sunday reflection.

The triumphant, expectant, joyous event of Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a young colt is recorded in all four gospels albeit with variations. It is a hugely significant event that sets the scene for the greatest week in the Christian Calendar. The scene is packed with symbolism, ritual and meaning. Connection is suggested to the ancient prophecy in Zechariah (9: 9-10), that a future King would come in humility. We note that Luke's inclusion of the word "peace" to the recorded praises "in heaven and in the highest places" shows a shift from the birth proclamation where "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!" (2:14).

Throughout Luke's narrative, themes of peace and glory permeate its pages however, in the present reality of this event it would appear here, a marked shift in the politics of the time is reflected. Jerusalem, as representative of the whole country was about to deny that the one riding the donkey had been sent by God to offer the world another way, an avenue to true peace. They couldn't get it, as witnessed by some pharisees in the crowd chiding Jesus, demanding that he call the crowd to silence (v.39). Jesus replies that the very stones would cry out in testimony to the deeds of Divine power for which the proclaiming multitude were praising Jesus as their king. His kingdom ethics flew in the face of the chosen values and methods of power employed at that time, and still do today.

Luke specifies that Jesus is hailed as a king, (v.38) a title given and accepted by Jesus, now that he has modelled Messianic kingship. Its hallmarks being a way of life that lives radical inclusiveness, compassion, generosity, reconciliation, agape, healing and restoration, embedded in prayer and praise. This by contrast to human kind's (in general) radical incapacity to understand its own violence, even when that violence is conveyed in the most explicit fashion. A choice of a 'them and us' mentality where deep division wounds and destroys.

Here on Palm Sunday, we see a living, choosing, inviting Jesus making one of his final offers to the people and powers of Jerusalem. An offer they reject because the cost of compassion and inclusive community is far greater than the system of scapegoating, shame and blame religion and power that remains in place. However, the offer REMAINS. Jesus will destroy death by its own mechanism and we his baptized followers have the privilege to live as Easter people and daily receive the fullness of life in him and be his forever.
