A Reading from the Acts to the Apostles

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?'

The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' *Acts 9.1-6* Hear the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

Psalm 30

I will exalt you, O Lord,

for you have drawn me up from the depths:

and have not suffered my foes to triumph over me.

O Lord my God, I cried to you:

and you have made me whole.

A Reading from Revelations

Then I saw between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders a Lamb standing as if it had been slaughtered, having seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth.

He went and took the scroll from the right hand of the one who was seated on the throne.

When he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twentyfour elders fell before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints.

They sing a new song:

'You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals,

for you were slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and people and nation;

you have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God, and they will reign on earth.'

Then I looked, and I heard the voice of many angels surrounding the throne and the living creatures and the elders; they numbered myriads of myriads and thousands of thousands,

singing with full voice,

'Worthy is the Lamb that was slaughtered to receive power and wealth and wisdom and might and honour and glory and blessing!'

Then I heard every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and in the sea, and all that is in them, singing,

'To the one seated on the throne and to the Lamb

be blessing and honour and glory and might for ever and ever!'

And the four living creatures said, 'Amen!' And the elders fell down and worshipped. *Revelation 5.6-14*

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

After these things Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.' They said to him, 'We will go with you.' They

went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, 'Children, you have no fish, have you?' They answered him, 'No.' He said to them, 'Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.' So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the lake. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off. When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.' So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead. When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend my sheep.' He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, 'Follow me.' John 21.1-19

For the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Reflection - Third Sunday after Easter.

My reflection on today's Gospel, John 21:1-19 leaves me pondering upon its profound, deep and beautiful simplicity. John paints an incredible scene that the reader can enter into as it unfolds verse by verse. We can sense the wearied disciples returning to the known, familiar ordinariness of fishing, no doubt emotionally traumatized and exhausted by the events surrounding the death of their beloved Master. Toiling all night till dawn, perhaps comforted by each other's presence, the group look toward a stranger on shore who directs them where to place their nets. Then the atmosphere becomes electric. The dash to the shore, the haul of fish and the thrill of being in the presence of their beloved Master. We hear the simplicity of the invitation to "come and have breakfast". How ordinary. How human. How welcoming! Then the crunch - the question to the one who thrice denied Jesus, can he affirm his love for his Lord? It would have been natural for Simon Peter to have expected Jesus to berate him for coming up empty, when his loyalty to Jesus was tested three times in the high priest's courtyard. Now, however, with the other disciples very still and silent, their hearts beating fast, resurrection enters the world, enters the lives of these disciples. Simon Peter's thrice profession of total, unequivocal love for his Lord gave rise to receiving deep, divine forgiveness. Jesus embraces the 'denier' and gives him the commission to feed 'my lambs/ sheep' (v17). John is wanting the reader to understand that Jesus is alive, that there is no revenge or payback, only freedom and new beginnings. In the presence of Jesus, Peter acknowledges his vulnerability, able to do so with Resurrected Love surrounding him and receives healing forgiveness for discipleship. To have Jesus there is the point of the text. The incredible thrill of being in His presence, giving a certainty embedded in a lived experience of resurrection. What it must have been like to awaken to the knowledge that Jesus was alive on that shore? We do know that the total metanoia John points to in this scene is evidenced in Acts 3 when Peter addresses huge crowds and due to the eloquence with which he spoke, "about three thousand were added to their number that day". The transforming power of Divine love received, acknowledged and passed on to others is testimony to Simon Peter's restored relationship with Jesus which grew humility, compassion, and a mission to the Gentile world. As His baptized, each of us has His Divine love within, the living Christ surrounds us; let us look to the shore and see him calling us, inviting us to breakfast, to Eucharist, to fellowship with Him and one another.
