A Reading from the Prophet Isaiah

For I am about to create new heavens

and a new earth;

the former things shall not be remembered

or come to mind.

But be glad and rejoice for ever

A Reading from The Second Letter to the Thessalonians

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labour we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right. 2 *Thessalonians 3.6-13*

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, he said, 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down.' They asked him, 'Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?' And he said, 'Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and, "The time is near!" Do not go after them. 'When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven. 'But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls. Luke 21.5-19 For the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Dean's Reflection

It's November, sometimes called "Kingdom Season" in the weeks leading up to the last Sunday of the church year, Christ the King (this year, 20th November, next week). It's quite usual that the lectionary supplies us with texts that have an apocalyptic flavour – texts which look through a time of calamity and disaster towards a glorious, promised future where all is reconciled and at peace, usually beyond the end of the world (as we know it).

The first reading for today, from Isaiah 65, is God speaking to the remnant people of Israel, and promising a time when they will no longer languish under an oppressive, foreign power, but will again live in their own land, eating its produce. The word bara, to create, appears several times through this text, indicating that it's not just about restoration, but rather about making something entirely new. For as we know, we cannot step into the same river twice, and when we return to a place we've left, we often find that it has changed (and so have we). So the promise God is making, the hope God holds out to the battered and despairing people of Israel, is one of new creation.

They, of course, took this in the context of a return from Babylon (and later generations – including Christians of various centuries) used this text as an excuse and justification for reclaiming the Holy Land for the Jewish people. But really, the

hope that is pointed to is beyond the confines of this world: the lion lying down with the lamb, peace being present on God's holy mountain... in the New Testament corpus, we see similar themes in Revelation.

This is the function of apocalyptic literature: it points right at the junction of now-but-not-yet. Whether the prophetic content of the vision has already been fulfilled, is yet to be fulfilled, or is being fulfilled, in God's time it *is*. There's a comfort for us in this, that beyond trauma and distress there is a new horizon – it's already there, we haven't come to it yet. And knowing that gives us strength to live in the liminal spaces between death and the new life that is promised.
