Today we celebrate St Anne's Day. This year we're celebrating 100 years of Gippsland Grammar, and there's been a long and strong connection between St Anne's and the Cathedral since the school's inception.

St Anne's Church of England Girls' Grammar School In the beginning ...
 The Church of England Girls' School was founded in 1924 by the Right Reverend G. H. Cranswick, second Bishop of Gippsland. It began as a small, primary day school for girls in St Paul's Cathedral Hall, under the care of Deaconess Marie Sundell, and gradually increased and expanded into the lower secondary grades. In 1934 the name of the school was changed to "St Anne's Church of England Girls' Grammar School" and a new school badge was adopted. (on front of bulletin) The day-school moved to the Raymond Street site, formerly used as the boys' hostel, in March 1936, with the boarding and day school accommodated on the same site from 1937. In 1971 St Anne's Church of England Girls' Grammar School amalgamated with the Gippsland Grammar School.

Saint Anne is patroness of unmarried women, housewives, women in labor or who want to be pregnant, grandmothers, mothers and educators. She is also a patroness of horseback riders, cabinet-makers and miners.

St. Anne, the mother of the Virgin Mary, according to tradition derived from certain apocryphal writings. As the grandparents of Jesus, Anne and her husband Joachim are also considered the patron saints of grandparents; their feast day is celebrated on July 26.

Information concerning her life, which startlingly parallels the Old Testament story of the barren Hannah and her conception of the prophet Samuel in non-scriptural sources, Anne (Hebrew: Ḥannah) was born in Bethlehem in Judaea. She married Joachim, and they shared a wealthy and devout life at Nazareth. Grieved by her

barrenness, Anne promised God that she would dedicate her firstborn child to the Lord's service. The couple then received a vision of an angel, who announced that Anne would conceive and bear a most wondrous child, Mary. When the child was three years old, Joachim and Anne, in fulfillment of her divine promise, brought Mary to the Temple of Jerusalem, where they left her to be brought up.

Dean's Doings

Greetings from muggy, WARM Darwin! 18 of the Cathedral Deans from around Australia are gathered here, to share stories, support one another, and talk about issues of mutual interest. Today (Saturday) we've got a day mostly at the cathedral, talking about the challenges of children's ministry at cathedrals, and about Hope25, the National Church's outreach initiative between Easter and Pentecost next year, which we in Sale will also be participating in. This afternoon we'll be spending some time in camera sharing stories and praying for one another, before heading off to a brief WWII Darwin tour. Apparently this will involve jumping on massive army trucks...

Yesterday morning we headed (far too early) to Nungalinga College where we joined the college community in worship. Songs were in English and the languages of the First Nations people who attend the college. We learned about the communities from which these leaders come - ranging from just 20 people to 1600 people, with incredibly diverse landscapes in which they live. These leaders gather at Nungalinga to be trained and equipped not just in theology and church leadership, but in things like learning to read and write English, as well as community development (all from within a Christian perspective).

After morning tea, we heard from the Wycliffe/AuSIL bible translators who told us about the work they've been doing to translate the scriptures into aboriginal languages. Kriol is the only fully translated bible. Many other languages have only portions of the scriptures available to them. We also heard from the leader of the group who are working on a Plain English Version, and we were graciously given a copy to bring home with us, of what they've translated so far. Bible translation is an area of great need.

The rest of yesterday was spent in camera, sharing stories, before we had dinner a wharf which is set up as a food court.

Thursday night started with a reception at Government House. The Governor of the NT is a lovely man, a former GP who has given a great deal to the community over many years. He and his wife were very gracious to us, welcoming us to Darwin.

It is hot and humid, even in this dry season. I am enjoying the warmth - but also discovering the benefits of hydrolyte! Really not used to this, after the bitter winter we've experienced this year.

Launch of the Prayer Trees St Paul's Cathedral, Sale 3pm on Sunday 1st Sept With guest speaker, Tony Rinaudo, agriculturalist, missionary, and author of *The Forest Underground: Hope for a Planet in Crisis*, Christian Book of the Year, 2022 Come along on Sunday 1st September, when the Cathedral will be hosting a diocesan-wide event: the launch of ¹_{SEP} the Prayer Trees. If churches across the diocese plant a tree, or dedicate an existing one, they will become a forest, dispersed across Gippsland.

The idea of a prayer tree is rather like lighting a candle in church – a written prayer pegged to a string on a tree symbolises the prayer continuing on after we have left the location.

Being outside, the prayer tree will be accessible to everyone, a place for prayer and contemplation. Trees across the Diocese – and beyond – will be united through this common desire to hold the prayers of all who visit these places.

This day also marks the beginning of the Season of Creation, when we praise God for creation and pray and commit to addressing the things that threaten its wellbeing. Light refreshments will be provided following the service at the

Cathedral. The launch will also be live-streamed for parishes across the diocese and any who need to watch from home.
