A Reading from the Book of Joshua

At that time the Lord said to Joshua, 'Make flint knives and circumcise the Israelites a second time.' So Joshua made flint knives, and circumcised the Israelites at Gibeath-haaraloth. This is the reason why Joshua circumcised them: all the males of the people who came out of Egypt, all the warriors, had died during the journey through the wilderness after they had come out of Egypt. Although all the people who came out had been circumcised, yet all the people born on the journey through the wilderness after they had come out of Egypt had not been circumcised. For the Israelites travelled for forty years in the wilderness, until all the nation, the warriors who came out of Egypt, perished, not having listened to the voice of the Lord . To them the Lord swore that he would not let them see the land that he had sworn to their ancestors to give us, a land flowing with milk and honey. So it was their children, whom he raised up in their place, that Joshua circumcised; for they were uncircumcised, because they had not been circumcised on the way. When the circumcising of all the nation was done, they remained in their places in the camp until they were healed. The Lord said to Joshua, 'Today I have rolled away from you the disgrace of Egypt.' And so that place is called Gilgal to this day. While the Israelites were encamped in Gilgal they kept the passover in the evening on the fourteenth day of the month in the plains of Jericho. On the day after the passover, on that very day, they ate the produce of the land, unleavened cakes and parched grain. The manna ceased on the day they ate the produce of the land, and the Israelites no longer had manna; they ate the crops of the land of Canaan that year. Joshua 5.2-12

A Reading from The Second Letter to the Corinthians

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. 2

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Then Jesus said, 'There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, "Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me." So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and travelled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, "How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son." But the father said to his slaves, "Quickly, bring out a robe—the best one—and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!" And they began to celebrate. 'Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, "Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound." Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, "Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!" Then the father said to him, "Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found." 'Luke 15.11-32 For the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Reflection

Today we read the familiar story about the Prodigal Son. For some of us it's easy to feel that we take on the role of the older son, always there, usually ignored. But the point of the story is to show us that God's love is there for us, no matter how much of a mess we have turned our lives into. When we're in the mud surrounded by the swine – a desperate situation for a pious Jew – we should remember that God is always willing to welcome us home with a warm embrace and a party.

Becoming Economically Empowered part 2

Lyn, Ofelia, and Rosalinda are members of Songcolan Seashore Livelihood Association (SSLA) in Batan Island in Aklan. They plant propagules of 'bakhaw' trees, a common mangrove tree species found in their locality. SSLA is a community organisation working with E-CARE, one of ABM AID's partners in the Philippines. In addition to their work in environmental protection, the women engage in E-CARE's Receivers to Givers program, which works with the strengths of the community to get access to cheap capital and then pass that opportunity on to others. SSLA works with their barangay's (local township's) Department of Environment and Natural Resources, particularly in mangrove protection and regeneration. SSLA is strongly supported by the barangay. Its most recent project with E-CARE, a rainwater catchment built around the roofing of the barangay hall, provides clean water to more than 50 households.

It's wonderful to be able to support women to flourish as they build peace in homes and communities, gain confidence in the wider world and become economically empowered. It's also great to play a part in supporting communities to be restored to wholeness after being trained in how to end gender-based violence and other injustices against women and girls.

Mothering Sunday Laetare Sunday Refreshment Sunday

Laetare means 'rejoicing'. The name comes from the first words of the Eucharist that have been used down the centuries Laetare, Jerusalem 'Rejoice Jerusalem'. In the midst of our Lenten discipline we are reminded that the purpose of it all is to be in the joy of the Lord. In some churches the vestments change from sombre violet to deep rose signalling the ending weeks of Lent and the approaching joy of Easter. In some parts of Europe the severe fast was broken on this day to include meat and sweets, like the **Simnel cake** we offer today. The word **simnel** comes from the Latin simila, meaning a finely ground flour (from which 'semolina' also derives).

Even dating as far back as the Middle Ages, Europeans honoured their mothers on the fourth Sunday of Lent, otherwise known as Mothering (or Simnel) Sunday. This was the one day each year when the European laborers, apprentices, and servants were allowed a holiday to return home and honour their mothers. Their Lenten fast was allowed to be broken, and all children would bake their mothers a special type of cake, a fruit cake with marzipan, that would then be enjoyed by the entire family on their day of rest. This was a special time and often the only time older children would see their mothers all year, which made it all the more important and special.

Conventionally, 11 marzipan balls are used to decorate the cake, symbolising the 12 apostles minus Judas Iscariot. Occasionally, 12 are used, representing Jesus and the 11 apostles.

In our Anglican heritage this Sunday is known as Mothering Sunday as traditionally, Mothering Sunday applied to the pilgrimage to the 'Mother' church of the Diocese - the cathedral, or to the nearest important regional church called *minsters*. These larger *minsters* were staffed by a college of priests. This was when many made their confession in preparation for Easter. It also became a time of family reunion, as people returned to where they were baptised etc.

On Mothering Sunday we must not forget that we belong to a spiritual family. We are not a parish all on our own, we belong to a diocese, and that diocese belongs to a province, and that province to a national Church. In turn that national Church is a sister Church in a world family.
