A Reading from The Acts of the Apostles

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must

suffer for the sake of my name.' So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.' All who heard him were amazed and said, 'Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem among those who invoked this name? And has he not come here for the purpose of bringing them bound before the chief priests?' Saul became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messiah. *Acts* 9:1-22

He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, 'Follow me.' Peter turned and saw the disciple whom Jesus loved following them; he was the one who had reclined next to Jesus at the supper and had said, 'Lord, who is it that is going to betray you?' When Peter saw him, he said to Jesus, 'Lord, what about him?' Jesus said to him, 'If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you? Follow me!' John 21.15-22

Today we celebrate the two great missionaries of the apostolic period. In the Gospel reading we see Jesus telling Peter to follow him – and Peter quibbling over the role of the Beloved Disciple. In the Epistle reading we see Paul at the end of his ministry, confidently declaring that God will grant him the crown of righteousness. He says, 'The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom.'

Dean's Desk

This week saw the clergy of the diocese gather at Raymond Island for our annual conference. This year we had bible studies from Louise Gosbell, a biblical theologian who specialises in disability, and she was working through Paul's image of the church as the Body of Christ in 1 Corinthians 12. We also had a session from Assistant Registrar Brian Norris about a bunch of changes and updates in the registry office, and a briefing from Tim Gaden who is the Ministry Wellbeing Development Officer and was tasked with introducing the idea of annual reviews for clergy. Part of the requirements from General Synod for clergy is a component of mandatory professional development. This year we focused on Bystander Training - which was confronting in a good way, and which I hope the facilitators will run for us some time early next year as I found what they had to say helpful.

Today is our Patronal Festival: St Paul's Day. What does that mean? Our Cathedral is "St Paul's". That means that when it was founded, those who founded it thought that St Paul the Apostle's life, teachings and example might have something to say to the future generations who worship here about how to follow Jesus. So today we remember and celebrate St Paul (and St Peter) and commit ourselves once more to take up the mantle of living as those "in Christ" and sharing freely with others the good news of God's love for the world.

There's an opportunity to learn more how to do that this afternoon at Stratford; we're up to the fourth session of Faith Shared - doesn't matter if you haven't been before, all are welcome and you'll learn something new!

At 4pm we gather in the community room to watch the livestream of the service from St Paul's Melbourne, their Provincial Evensong - which is one of the ways they are also celebrating their Patronal Festival, by inviting and gathering representatives from the regional dioceses of Victoria.

Mission of the Month The Mission to Seafarers

The Mission to Seafarers is an international mission of the Anglican Church.

MTS cares for the practical and spiritual welfare of seafarers of all nationalities and faiths. There are 230 Mission sites around the world.

At the four centres in Victoria – Melbourne, Portland, Geelong and Hastings – work is carried out by a small number of staff, chaplains and volunteers who give freely of their time 365 days of the year.

While most seafarers are well treated, some are still abandoned in ports far from their homes, or remain unpaid or forced to work in unsafe or unacceptable conditions. In such situations, the Mission plays a vital role in providing practical care and moral support.

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From the Bible Society UK

Your prayers are powerful. Christians in Iran, Israel and other places at war depend on the prayers of their brothers and sisters around the world. This week especially, Bible Society workers and their church families in those places are asking for your prayers.

Will you pray through the following points suggested by the Arab-Israeli Bible Society?

- Peace around the world. Ask God to break the cycle of fear, revenge, and destruction
- Reconciliation between Ukrainians and Russians, people in the Bible Lands and Iran, and any peoples fighting right now
- Wisdom for leaders, courage for anyone threatened, and comfort for the grieving
- Unity and boldness in the Church so God's people are seen to transcend the world's divisions

Christians in Iran have also asked for your prayer in these areas:

- Protection for the vulnerable. As life in Iran is turned upside down, remember especially women who are pregnant and the elderly
- The liberation of Iran. Pray for the freedom of the land where all people may celebrate life
- Christian love for all. Ask God to empower the scattered Christian communities of Iran to serve their Muslim neighbours

Pray for Bible mission as well and a powerful witness at this time. Bible Society workers are asking personally for your prayers. The team in Nazareth said that missile fragments landed near their neighbourhood, and Anatoliy, who leads the team in Kyiv, says that a blast wave and shrapnel hit his home. Ask God to keep them safe and strengthen them in their outreach.

As you pray, you can reflect on the difference your support makes. There are Christians facing terror today who have hope because you put God's word in their hands. Your support for Bible mission in Iran and the Bible Lands, especially this year, is having an amazing impact in real lives right now.
