A Reading from the Second Book of Chronicles

Now after the death of Jehoiada the officials of Judah came and did obeisance to the king; then the king listened to them. They abandoned the house of the Lord, the God of their ancestors, and served the sacred poles and the idols. And wrath came upon Judah and Jerusalem for this guilt of theirs. Yet he sent prophets among them to bring them back to the Lord; they testified against them, but they would not listen. Then the spirit of God took possession of Zechariah son of the priest Jehoiada; he stood above the people and said to them, 'Thus says God: Why do you transgress the commandments of the Lord, so that you cannot prosper? Because you have forsaken the Lord, he has also forsaken you.' But they conspired against him, and by command of the king they stoned him to death in the court of the house of the Lord. King Joash did not remember the kindness that Jehoiada, Zechariah's father, had shown him, but killed his son. As he was dying, he said, 'May the Lord see and avenge!' *2 Chronicles 24.17-22*

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Stephen, full of grace and power, did great wonders and signs among the people. Then some of those who belonged to the synagogue of the Freedmen (as it was called), Cyrenians, Alexandrians, and others of those from Cilicia and Asia, stood up and argued with Stephen. But they could not withstand the wisdom and the Spirit with which he spoke. When they heard these things, they became enraged and ground their teeth at Stephen. But filled with the Holy Spirit, he gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. 'Look,' he said, 'I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!' But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.' Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them.' When he had said this, he died.

Celebrating 175 Years

Dean's Desk



Greetings from Perth and the National Deans' Conference.

We haven't yet had our official picture taken, but here's one of me and my colleague Naomi, who's the Dean of Grafton, looking down from the Perth Council Building over St George's Cathedral. We'd just attended a reception hosted by the Deputy Lord Mayor while gazing at the incredible view over the Swan River.

So far it's been an intense time. Thursday afternoon started with an informal gathering in Holy Grounds, a coffee shop the Cathedral is running in partnership with the Diocese (who owns the building it's in) and Anglicare WA. Holy Grounds is aimed at addressing the issues of isolation in the city, providing a quiet space for one on one meetings, for craft and connecting activities, as a drop in point for visitors and others looking for a kind word or a good coffee.

We then moved on to Evening Prayer and a Reception at Government House (which is almost opposite the Cathedral, next to the council building). We were given a tour of the public areas of the House, which includes a ballroom which was the scene of a murder in the 1930s. The murdered person was deemed by the jury to have deserved it, and the murderer was let off. • We had dinner at a fancypants Italian restaurant (the kind of place that does four tiny course over 2 hours...).

Friday was intense: we started with morning prayer and eucharist, moving into a bible study on passages from Genesis by Meg Warner, who heads up Wollaston College (the theological college here). We had a very intense session talking about our differences, and then Bishop Richard joined us via zoom to talk about the Nairobi-Cairo Proposal which The Inter Anglican Standing Commission on Unity, Faith and Order (IASCUFO) has been developing. The Proposal suggests a few small but major changes to the structure of the Instruments of Unity which will mean an Anglican Communion led by a bunch of folk who more accurately represent its make up. Friday lunch we headed across to the Council reception, then returned for another session in which we actually made some headway and came to a solution for how to proceed living with difference which will help to shape next year's conference. After Evening Prayer there was a little free time before a spectacular dinner at the Weld Club (the kind of place the waiter puts the napkin on your lap).

Saturday we started with morning prayer and eucharist, had another bible study with Meg, another session in which we listened to Deans' stories, and then after a late morning tea we jumped on the free bus to go out to Kings Park for a smoking ceremony and welcome to country which was offered generously by one of the local aunties, who told us in language the names of the places that made up country for her nation. It was deeply moving.

Sunday morning I'm preaching at the 10am service - think of me as you're eating your lunch, given that we're two hours behind the east coast! And then we're heading on a walking tour of Perth CBD, finishing at Elizabeth Quay for lunch, before some afternoon sessions, Evensong, and a reception hosted by Archbishop Kay Goldsworthy at a nearby venue (Bishopscourt's roof collapsed and is currently being fixed so we can't meet there!).

On Monday we'll have morning prayer and eucharist, another bible study, morning tea, and session, and then we're off to Fremantle for the day on the train, before a final dinner on Monday night. I'll be on the red-eye home, leaving at midnight and getting into Melbourne at an ungodly hour.

Looking forward to being back with you all... and having a wonderful time with my colleagues here,

Stephen, Saint, Deacon and Martyr

First Christian martyr. He was a Hellenist, a Greek-speaking Jew born and reared outside Palestine. His name is Greek, meaning "crown." He was one of the seven chosen by the Jerusalem congregation to see that the Hellenistic Jewish Christians got their fair share of the contributions. Stephen's preaching caused a revolution in the attitude of some of the Jewish people toward the young Christian church. There was a period of persecution which scattered Christians into many parts of the world outside Jerusalem. The young Pharisee, Saul of Tarsus, witnessed Stephen's stoning and heard the martyr's prayer for his enemies. Saul eventually took up the work cut short by Stephen's death.
