11:00am Tuesday in Holy Week 15 April 2025 In Holy Week, Christian people gather in the cathedral church of the diocese with their deacons and priests around the diocesan bishop to celebrate the blessing of oils and renewal of ordination vows.

Jesus is the Christ, 'the Anointed One', and we are 'Christened' by water and the Spirit as we are anointed in his faith, hope, and love. In the synagogue at Nazareth as he began his ministry, Jesus appropriated to himself the words of the prophet Isaiah, 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me ...' (Luke 4:18) Christians are anointed with the sign of the cross as daughters and sons of God, called and consecrated for lives of service after the pattern of the Servant and Son of God who gave his life as a ransom for many.

Oil is an especially important liturgical symbol during Easter because it is the privileged time for adult initiation and the baptism of children. The entire Christian community renews the promises of baptism at the Easter Vigil.

The Oil of the Sick is pure olive oil, favoured since ancient times for its soothing and healing qualities. As we read in the Letter of James, 'Are any among you sick? They should call for the presbyters of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed.' (5:14-16)

The Oil of Catechumens is also pure olive oil. It traditionally was used with those preparing for baptism, to strengthen their resolve in renouncing evil and turning to Christ. The notion of being strengthened by oil is scriptural. God's anointing fortifies us to face evil (Ps 45:8 and Heb 1:9) and enlightens our intellect from falsehood (1 Jn 2:27). The prayer of blessing for the oil of catechumens indicates these fruits when it asks God to bless those who are anointed with it as a sign of God's defence in their "fight against sin, the world and the devil", so that they may cling to the knowledge of Christ's victory as they share in it.

The Oil of Chrism is a rich blend of aromatic oils, fragrances, and pure olive oil with a characteristic perfume. One of the ingredients of chrism is balsam, an oily, resinous, and odorous substance, which flows spontaneously or by incision from certain plants. Another ingredient is myrrh, which has a long history of use in worship. With cinnamon, myrrh was the principal ingredient used by Moses to anoint the Tabernacle or Tent of Meeting, and the Ark of the Covenant.

In the Gospel of Matthew the Magi present myrrh as a gift to the infant Jesus, a symbol of his prophetic ministry, pre-figuring his death and burial.

In consecrating the Oil of Chrism, the bishop first pours the mixture of balsam and myrrh into the olive oil. The bishop then prays the prayer of blessing. Finally, the bishop breathes three times in the form of a cross over the chrism, a sign of the Spirit descending into the oil, in an action reminiscent of the crucified and raised Lord breathing his Spirit on his disciples in the evening of the first Easter Day.

The Oil of the Sick is used in the Church's ministry of healing – as Christ cares tenderly for his people in times of anxiety and sickness, and when we are close to death.

The Oil of Catechumens is used to anoint those who are preparing for baptism. It is also used in deliverance ministry, proclaiming the truth of Christ's resurrection triumphing over darkness, sin, evil, and death.

The Oil of Chrism is used to anoint the newly baptised. It is also used in the ordination of priests and bishops, in the consecration of churches and the coronation of Christian monarchs.

This Eucharist is also the occasion when deacons and priests of the diocese in collegial unity with their bishop renew their ordination vows.

Following the sermon, the Bishop invites first the whole people of God, followed by the lay readers, deacons, and priests, to reaffirm their baptismal and (as appropriate) ordination vows, drawing on the language of the ordinal for those in holy orders. The deacon of the Eucharist then invites the bishop to reaffirm his or her vows in the same way.

This Eucharist is an act of repentance and renewal. It prepares clergy and laity to participate in and proclaim the Passion, death and resurrection of Jesus. To be the bearers of this mystery of salvation is awesome indeed.

May we know that we stand on holy ground "as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries" (1 Corinthians 4:1).

Blessed are you Sovereign God, Creator of all that is, upholding by your grace all who hear your call.
Under your covenant priests and rulers were anointed to serve you, and in the fulness of time you anointed your Son by the Holy Spirit to be the Christ, the Saviour and Servant of all.

By the power of your Spirit may your blessing rest on those who are anointed with this Chrism in your name. Let it be for them a sign of joy and gladness as they share in the royal priesthood of the New Covenant and make known the kingdom of Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy Spirit we lift our voices of thanks and praise.

Blessed be God, our strength and our salvation, now and for ever. Amen.
